Nominations Notifications 2022-23 Season

We would like to give you advance notice of a change to the way in which nominees will be advised of their nomination in a category from this Season.

Due to the problems experienced this year with the Royal Mail postal service, it has been agreed by the Rose Bowl Committee that individual nomination certificates will no longer be posted out to clubs. All nominations will be announced on the Rose Bowl website. At the same time the arrangements for purchasing tickets to the Awards Ceremony will also be emailed to the nominated clubs. This will ensure all nominees, be it a club or an individual, learn of their nomination at the same time.

Professional or Amateur?

We would like to remind clubs entering that The Rose Bowl Awards are open to amateur clubs and performers not professionals. It is stated in the entry form, Amateur (sic) shall mean any player who does not seek to earn a living by means of theatrical, cinematography, television or spoken word performance. When it is seen in programmes that a performer is just going into or coming from paid performances as well as participating in an amateur production, they will be classed as professional. This will have a reflection on the production as a whole and will of course have a knock-on effect on possible nominations, not just for an individual but the whole production.

Joan Hawkins

When, after founding and supporting The Rose Bowl Awards for twenty years, the Bristol Evening Post decided to withdraw their support in 1991, their then Theatre Critic David Harrison, who had taken over that post from John Coe, who with the 'Posts' managing director Walter Hawkins, had instigated the Rose Bowl Awards, declared 'well that's the end of that'. Fine journalist and Critic that he was, David had a blind spot when it came to Amateur Theatre, being unable to find anything of merit in such a theatrical form.

'What makes you say that' I asked 'do you imagine all the clubs are now going to pack up producing shows and lose their interest in The Rose Bowl Awards?'. With the then secretary of the 'Awards' we quickly found a new



sponsor in the Nat West Insurance group. After two years however they decided that they could not continue with their sponsorship cutting us adrift just as the new season was about to start. After a conference of war with the adjudicators, they agreed to work until Christmas without remuneration in the hope that a new sponsor could be found by that time.

When November arrived and no new sponsor was looming on the horizon things were indeed looking very dark for the future of the Rose Bowl Awards. It was then that I received a telephone call from a lady, Joan Hawkins. I had met her but once before, at an Awards ceremony held in the board room of the Bristol Evening Post. After enquiring what the present position was with the Rose Bowl Awards, she invited me, at the time it felt more like a summons rather than an invitation, to come to her home 'The Loans' to discuss the matter.

To say that I was apprehensive as I drove down that long drive to The Loans for the first time would be putting it mildly. As I was passed a cup of tea, I was so nervous that like Elizabeth, Hyacinth Bucket's neighbour in 'Keeping up Appearances', I was sure that I was about to spill it all over the carpet, finally dropping and breaking the cup and saucer. It was immediately obvious, fortunately, that my host was no Hyacinth Bucket, here was a lady genuinely interested in The Rose Bowl Awards, and very determined to ensure that her late husband Walter's theatrical brainchild, which she knew to be the envy of many local newspapers throughout the country, was nor about to disappear into oblivion. I set out that day fearing for the future of the Rose Bowl and returned home sure that it's future was secure.

Under Joan's guidance a small, but hard working, fully committed committee was quickly formed, ideas for fund raising, concerts, shows, productions and, events in the garden of the Loans appeared, all driven with fierce determination by Joan. Despite all these efforts on more than one occasion in those early days our new Treasurer Peter Stoppard, would have to announce that the adjudicators, and others requiring bills to be paid would have to wait until the coffers were replenished. Time after time at this juncture Joan would announce that she had not made a donation for some time and come to our financial rescue. Such gestures were never allowed to be heard of outside the committee meeting held at the Loans.

After the disastrous Awards ceremony at Leigh Court, Joan, with strong Support from Bernard Fennell, realised that running, and expanding the Rose Bowl, encouraging new Awards for Youth productions and performances, for technical achievement, at the same time keeping interest alive for classical theatre, was one thing, running a successful Awards evening was quite another animal. The sub-committee under the expert leadership of Richard Jones proved to be more than just adequate for the job turning, with Joan forever keeping a motherly, but always determined eye on plans, turning the Awards evening into a most prestigious theatrical event for local theatre.

When you look at the strong based firmly established position the Rose Bowl Awards now occupy it is almost impossible to remember the precarious position they were in when Joan made that initial telephone call to a very worried chairman. We have been very lucky to have had someone at our head who had such great love for the Awards, and put so much energy, time and commitment into building them into such a prestigious part of local theatre.

To say that we will miss her is like telling someone dying of thirst that they will not miss having a drink of water.
